HT Activity - Leaf Suncatcher

This is a wonderful, inexpensive fall activity that will work for a variety of populations. If possible, go outdoors with participants to pick leaves in combination with making leaf suncatchers or as a separate activity. Pressing leaves is also a good precursor to this activity although newly picked leaves can also be used.

Materials:

Fall-themed paper plates Clear adhesive contact paper Scissors and pencils Leaves (fresh or pressed) Single-hole punch Yarn or ribbon

Steps:

- 1. Cut out the middle of the plate, leaving the rimmed edges. First two steps can be done by you before the group or by your participants if they are able.
- 2. With the cut-out circle, trace two slightly larger circles (about 1" larger) out of clear contact paper and cut them out.
- 3. Adhere one contact paper circle to the back of the plate with the sticky side facing out.
- 4. Arrange leaves on the contact paper. Keep in mind that once leaves touch the sticky surface they can't be moved. Participants may first want to plan out leaf positions on the cut-out middle of the plate.
- 5. Cover the leaves with the second piece of contact paper pressing the edges into the plate rim.
- 6. Make a hole for hanging at the top of the suncatcher with a hole punch in the rim of the paper plate.
- 7. Thread the yarn or ribbon through the hole and hang the suncatcher on a window with a piece of tape or on a hook or nail.

Discussion possibilities:

- Observe and talk about the differences in leaf size, shape and color. Why do leaves change color in the autumn?
- Changes the new season will bring to nature. What tools do individuals possess to help them to survive and thrive in times of change?
